She realizes that the true identity of a person does not lie in being an Indian or American, but lies in the inner strength of mind of the person to be peace within herself. She is a true feminist who confronts in life to ascertain herself and her identity in the society.

Jasmine's way to America is characterized by distressing experience, the first and the worst, in a long series of adoption which requires her to manage ethics in order to survive. The conversion of identity from obedient submissive widow to self-confident and individualistic American women is in full swing. Jasmine crystalizes her dream of becoming American by fighting against all odds.

The journey of the protagonist from India to the U.S. and shift from one culture to the other in the course of living, change of culture and multiculturalism makes up the important themes of Jasmine. The very typical aspect of multiculturalism in the novel appears to be the cause and effect of the other. A careful analysis with an introspective and critical view, it appears that multiculturalism has a great role in Jasmine's journey from India to the United States. Jasmine is ready for next recreation as Jazzy and lets herself be refashioned by Lilian Gordon, whose assignment in life is to help aliens who service in America. She gives her mental strength to Jasmine. "Now remember, if you walk and talk American, they will think you were born here. Most Americans can't imagine anything else" (134-135). She is not Jasmine, the city girl anymore.

She is Jazzy, the American illegal immigrant, full of promises and possibilities. Thus Jasmine undergoes transformation by readily accepting the American culture to make her dreams come true.

The second instance of immigration in Jasmine's life seems to have much to do with culture and also with multiculturalism. The time that Jasmine had spent in the U.S.A with Prakash had made her adapt to a western culture that is not at least, as superstitious as that of India. When Jasmine returns from U.S.A to her family in India, she has to choose either performing "sati" according to the rigid tradition of her family or to lead the life of Jasmine in America. Now she chooses to become an illegal immigrant to Florida symbolizing her journey of transformations, displacements, and shift of identities. Jasmine's journey towards western culture begins as her identity as a typical Hindu widow as she meets people like Taylor or Bud. Her identities as 'Jase', as Taylor called her, and as 'Jane' as Bud called her, are not reflections of her shifting identities but also her shedding one culture and adapting the other.
